

PROCEEDINGS OF THE STATE LEVEL TECHNICAL COMMITTEE (SLTC) MEETING HELD ON 10.03.2022 at TSCAB, H.O., HYDERABAD TO FIX SCALES OF FINANCE FOR THE YEAR 2022-23.

The State Level Technical Committee (SLTC) meeting of Telangana State was convened on 10.03.2022 at TSCAB, Head office. The Managing Director, TSCAB (Convenor, SLTC) welcomed Sri M Raghunandhan Rao, IAS, Agriculture Production Commissioner (APC)/ Secretary to Govt. of Telangana (Chairman, SLTC), Officials of SLBC, NABARD, various Department heads, Universities, Bankers and other members of the committee and emphasized the importance of fixing Scales of Finance (SoF) which is base for the determining the limit to KCC. Further, the Convenor informed that vide G.O.Rt No. 119 dated 02.03.2021, Agri & Cooperation Dept., Govt of Telangana reconstituted the State Level Technical Committee(SLTC) by considering recommendations of NABARD. The convenor gave a detailed snapshot on NABARD revised broad based guidelines like Re-constitution of DLTC & SLTC, timelines, notification etc., based on the suggestions made by the internal working group constituted by Reserve Bank of India. The Convenor explained the method of arriving the SoF and requested the delegates to actively participate and offer their valuable suggestions to fix and adopt the Scales of Finance for 2022-23.

In the opening remarks, the chairman of the SLTC Committee, Sri M Raghunandhan Rao, IAS, Agriculture Production Commissioner (APC)/ Secretary to Govt. of Telangana, explained the importance of SLTC Meeting and how it will influence the activities of the farming community. Further, Chairman expressed concern about the share of Agriculture with respect to total investment by Banks which is very low despite the nationalization and expansion of rural banking, which is reflected in different schemes like Rythu Bandhu, PM Kisan etc. The Chairman informed that the extent to which the new farmers are brought into the fold of agriculture and the extent of agriculture sector coverage are the two biggest areas of performance benchmarks and advised the Bankers to fix the limits/scales appropriately.

In the context of crop loans, the Chairman had anticipated a major expansion in the cultivation of Oilpalm as Government of Telangana has

allocated budget of Rs.1000.00 crore in the recent budget sessions, rapid growth in cotton in the next Kharif season and major changes in pulses & oilseeds. The Chairman stated that despite a few technical issues in Dharani Portal, standardized database of farmers is now available in the portal. The Chairman further stated that all these suggestions are in the backdrop for digital agriculture as next stage of agriculture may use Artificial Intelligence, Precision farming, Crop productivity etc and keeping technological innovation into consideration, he advised the Committee to fix realistic Scales of Finance(SoF).

The official of SLBC pointed out some of the issues facing by the Banks in Dharani portal and Chairman advised to come up with a detailed note covering all the issues for further discussions to resolve the same.

The AGM, NABARD suggested to publish advertisement in local newspaper with respect to the Agriculture Infrastructure Fund(AIF) scheme as the farmers are not aware of the scheme details. The AGM informed that there is an interest subvention applicable upto Rs.2.00 crores and 25% subsidy under AMI, which is double advantage for the farmers and further opined that there is a need for revision in working out the scale of finance which is currently arrived by taking the least of the cost of cultivation and 50% of the gross crop-yield.

Representatives from Prof. Jayashankar Telangana State Agriculture University, Dr.R.Vijaya Kumari (Deputy Director of Research) & ICAR Research Institute, Dr.S.V.Ramana Rao(ICAR-IIOR) have informed that the year 2022-23 is the International Year of Millets and requested to encourage the cultivators of pulses by enhancing the Scales of Finance of Pulses.

While presenting the proposals for Scales of Finance (SOF) for Animal Husbandry activities, special invitee Dr T. Srinivasa Mohan (Retd DGM NABARD) explained the basis for arriving at the SOF. Due deliberations were held with MD, TSCAB and other members on indicating a range for all the activities, post which, the scales of finance have been approved by the SLTC for Animal Husbandry activities.

The members of SLTC had detailed discussions on the cost of cultivation, value of gross yield basing on Geographical conditions of each district pertaining to all major crops and approved suggestive range of Scales of finance, taking into consideration of the local factors.


The officials from Departments of Cooperation, Agriculture, Horticulture, Fisheries, Agriculture University, ICAR, Veterinary University, NABARD, SLBC, APGVB, Telangana Grameena Bank, SBI, Union Bank of India, Punjab National Bank and Canara Bank have extended their valuable suggestions and played important role in fixing of Scales of Finance for various crops and working capital requirement for Animal Husbandry and Fisheries.


Smt T.Jyothi, Chief General Manager, TSCAB has appraised to the Committee the crop-wise Scales of Finance fixed by the DLTCs at their respective Districts.

The Committee requested to indicate the district-wise area of cultivation under each crop in the working sheets of Agriculture Department for fixing of Scales of Finance in a realistic manner.

The Chairman of SLTC advised the Managing Director (Convenor, SLTC) to schedule a meeting with the CEOs of the DCCBs (Convenors of DLTCs) before convening the DLTC meeting for the ensuing year to sensitize the members of DLTC for fixation of Scales of Finance uniformly so that there should not be much variations in range of Scales of Finance. Further, the Chairman stated that wherever the SoF recommended/proposed by DLTC are on higher side by more than 10% of existing SoF, the DLTC shall justify the reasons for the same

After elaborate discussions, the Committee resolved to fix Uniform Scales of finance across the Telangana State and advised the respective DLTCs to follow the Scales of Finance fixed by the SLTC.




